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Progress Report: East Lyme's Overlook Park

The view above, from the roof of the Niantic River railroad bridge control house, taken on August 21, 2012, looks toward Hole in the Wall and shows both the two new tracks approaching the new bridge and the old tracks carrying an Acela heading to Boston about to cross the Niantic River on the new bridge. You also see the new beach created by placing more than 70,000 cubic yards of sand along the approximately 2,500 foot long Amtrak project. Note especially the dotted line, which indicates the prior approximate location of the high tide shoreline in 2010 before the new track alignment was shifted south by 58 feet at the new bridge. The old beach was estimated to cover approximately 1.5 acres at high tide and the new beach, shown here at about mid-tide, is estimated to cover 9± acres at high tide.

Note the piles of 200 cubic yards of cobbles and 800 cubic yards of sand, gravel, and stone, that are to be spread on the beach, thus adding to its stability and growth over the years by natural erosion and accretion of sediments.
